Dwight was a teacher at Countryside School in Barrington, IL, Lake Zurich Schools and after their move to the northwoods at North Lakeland Elementary School. At the time, we were the largest-ever class (close to 40) and he team taught with Gladys Hill. It could be an unruly class at times, and he was usually put in charge of calming down the boys. Mr. Sandman was very unruffled and kind, and I enjoyed learning history and math from him. My great-grandfather passed away that year, and I remember Mr. Sandman being very sympathetic to me as I explained what had happened, and that I would be missing school for the next week or so, as we traveled to be with family.
